# What is Women's Business 2nd Chance

The Women's Business Second Chance Hub (WBSC) is a ground-breaking program for women at risk of being left behind. It aims to give them the chance to achieve quality learning, entrepreneurship and employment outcomes through access to educational, employment and support services, tailored to their needs as learners and future earners.

Many First Nations women have found themselves marginalised - excluded economically and socially through circumstance and stereo type.

Since it's establishment in March 2020, the Women's **Business Hub 2nd Chance Hub (WB2C) in Rooty Hill has** now been in operation for over 18 months.

It is designed to be a Culturally Safe Women's only space to empower disadvantaged Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander women and give them a second chance to realise their life goals and improve their current social, economic and environmental circumstance

#### Welcome 2022



# Tafe & Women's Business

Women's Business 2nd Chance Hub aims is to create meaningful and lasting opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Women all over NSW. We do this by providing access to quality learning, entrepreneurship, and employment through our educational and vocational training workshops.

We also aim to ensure our Aspirants feel fully supported in their Cultural Identity whilst taking on their studies.

We do this by providing a culturally safe space at the Hub where they can come and have access to computers and printing facilities and our Reach Out team if needed.



Over the past couple of months Women's Business 2nd Chance has been working with TAFE NSW to negotiate a variety of training packages. So far, we have secured 4 training packages that will each go for 12 months. We are looking at three of those packages to commence this November.

All the Aspirants that have expressed interest are very keen to attend the upcoming information sessions and are keen to get started. We look forward to more exciting updates in this space in the next coming newsletters.

# Aspirant Story

# **Jamie Thaidy**

At age 45, Jamie Thaidy re-joined formal education through Women's Business 2nd Chance Hub Programme, along with her two daughters. Jamie is currently enrolled in the Cert III in Community Services and is wanting to upskill herself. Jamie comes from Kempsey on the Mid North Coast of NSW, and whilst living up there for most of her life, she started out as an Aboriginal Education Officer, then also went on to complete her Cert IV in Business Administration, Cert IV in Youth work, which also led her to starting to work in the local Aboriginal Community

When Jamie relocated to Sydney in 2014, she was a stay-at-home mother, however, wanted to upskill herself to get back into the workforce. She then had a set back with her health, and now she is feeling stable and confident about her health but much more about gaining even more confidence in Certificate III and Certificate IV in Community Services.

When it comes to supporting her children and other community members on how to and where to find services in our community, she has a great connections and is able to steer them in the right direction.

In time, Jamie is working on becoming employed fulltime

# Sydney Region Aboriginal Corporation (SRAC)

Real Futures Women's Business 2nd Chance Hub is working with Sydney Region Aboriginal Corporation to empower, provide assistance and achieve outcomes for Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Women across Greater Sydney.

Sydney Region Aboriginal Corporation (SRAC), is a community-controlled not for profit Indigenous Corporation providing a range of advocacy, social-emotional and capacity building support services to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in a culturally safe and inclusive environment.

#### **Our mission**

To improve health, economic, social and emotional outcomes for Aboriginal people in Greater Western Sydney & Nepean Blue Mountains. SRAC was formed by Uncle Trevor Christian, OAM in November 1996 to address the overpopulation of Aboriginal & Torres Strait people in the prison system and the issues that contribute to the ongoing disparity in health and wellbeing between Indigenous and non-Indigenous SRAC have proudly continued Uncle Trevor's work for 25 years. We facilitate early diagnosis and early intervention of disability and/or at-risk behaviours, education, family supports, cultural connection and capacity building training and support services in an environment that fosters resilience and self-determination.

## Key areas of operation

Advocacy, Disability Services, Aged Care Services, Youth Justice & Prison Support Services, Aboriginal Family Supported Playgroup/Early Intervention Services.

# Our Key Highlights

From the commencement of the program to the 10th of December 2021, a total of 400 women have registered at the Women 's Business Hub in Western Sydney. Of these, the highest proportion were in the 25-34 years of age group (29%). Just over a fifth (21%) were aged 20-24 years, 16% were in the 35-44 and 18% were 15-19 years of age. Another 11% were aged between 45-54 years and 4% aged 55-64 years. Only 1% were over 65 years of age.

Most of the women heard about the Women's business hub through Real Futures staff (57%) or through family and friends (21%), while 8% came from an external organisation, 6% from social media, and 5% through a job provider.

A total of 234 women completed some form of training to date. By 10th December 2021 approximately 111 women had engaged in some form tertiary training. Of those 50 women had completed their tertiary course, while a further 61 are currently in attendance of some form of tertiary training.

In addition, a further 209 women have participated in some form of non-tertiary training over the same period, with 184 who have completed their non-tertiary training and another 25 currently attending some form of non-tertiary training (Note some women may have attended more than one course).

Over the past quarter courses completed included: Business Cert III Traineeships (4 women), Traffic Control (10 women) and White Cards (6 women); Sewing Class (11 women); Cert III in Business (1 woman) Teams online training (54 women); Many Rivers Online Business Workshops (8 women).

■ A total of 73 women had commenced employment at the hub by 10th December 2021 since the start of the program. The highest proportions of which were working for Government organisations (16%), in the Warehousing (11%), Retail or Health sectors (10% respectively). A further 7% respectively were employed in the Aged Care sector with Australian Unity or Employment Services sector. Another 5% were employed in the Hospitality sector. Smaller proportions across a range of sectors. Most of these roles were full-time positions (70%) and part-time and casual roles (15% respectively). Those who gained employment were mainly from the Level 2 (50%) and Level 3 (38%) categories.



# Jaymie-Lea, Gabbi, Amarni and Maleah




\*\* : To be able to empower another Woman is one of the most empowering things I could do as a Woman and that could even be just empowering them to just smile.. \*\*\*
